



Relationship Abuse Reality Check

Conflict should never lead to violence.

Healthy relationships are defined by enjoyment, communication, support, and **respect**. Teens should feel comfortable, secure, and trusting of one another.

- ✓ **1 in 3** teens in the U.S. is **physically, sexually, emotionally, or verbally abused** by a dating partner
- ✓ Youth who experience dating violence are **less likely to use condoms**, in fear that their partner will react violently


Violence doesn't always leave bruises.

Youth will not always be direct if they are experiencing abuse within a relationship, but may exhibit signs or behaviors that are **questionable and less clear**.

- ✓ Only **1 in 3** teens in a violent relationship **ever tells anyone** about their abuse
- ✓ The **longer** a teen is in an abusive relationship, the **less likely** they are to **report abuse**

Peer bullying is a problem.

- ✓ **4 in 5** teens who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual transgender, or questioning (LGBTQ) face **harassment** at school
- ✓ Youth who experience victimization based on **sexual orientation and gender expression** have lower self-esteem and higher rates of **depression** than other youth



Youth who identify as LGBTQ may face **more barriers** in seeking help dealing with relationship abuse.

Relationship Abuse Fact Sheet References
